**10:00–11:00 am Program: Compassionate Listening and the Art of Understanding:** How can we listen to understand, instead of just listening to hear? How can we more empathetically see a person on “the other side” as a whole human being with emotions, values and a story – not necessarily as being just like us, but as being worthy of compassion? Friends Gathered at 12:53 PM and settled into a period of silent worship.

**Welcome** – Clerk Leo Fitzpatrick welcomed Friends at 12:55 PM

**Agenda** – The agenda was reviewed and approved

**Roll Call of Meetings** – Wendy Kane asked Friends to identify themselves when their meeting was called. The Roll is as follows: Bristol – 0; Buckingham – 2; Doylestown – 0; Fallsington – 2; Lehigh Valley – 2; Makefield – 2; Middletown – 2; Newtown – 2; Plumstead – 0; Quakertown – 3; Solebury – 2; Southampton – 6; Wrightstown – 6; Yardley – 2.

**Correction and clarification of previous minutes** – Wendy Kane announced that we had discovered discrepancies and errors in the minutes of the BQM meetings in both May and August of 2020. Wendy read the corrections. **The corrected minutes for May 2020 and August 2020 were approved.**

**Minutes of Previous Meeting** – Terry Christensen read the minutes from the February 2021 BQM. **Minutes Approved.**

**Stories of Vitality and Strength** were shared from Newtown, Quakertown, Makefield, Bristol and Southampton meetings.

**Quarter Coordinator Report** – BQM Coordinator Wendy Kane provided her report. Highlights include: Falling infection rates and increasing vaccinations are prompting many meeting to consider reopening for in person meetings. Some meetings are moving forward with a hybrid model that incorporates both virtual and in-person attendance while other meetings have discerned that they will only meet for worship in person. Recorders of Membership met recently and discussed topics related to tracking meeting membership; PYM has requested current membership statistics. BQ Outreach has a new Clerk (Doug Meaker – Quakertown) and they are proactive in increasing membership and events as COVID subsides.

**Annual Report – Bristol Meeting** - Paul Shaffer – Bristol attendance continues to be low; COVID a significant factor; in warmer months Friends gathered outside under a large tree. BMM will participate in Historic Bristol Day which takes place in October. BMM committee meetings were held online and that kept the membership involved. BMM has maintained its contributions to BQM and PYM.

**Annual Report – Fallsington Meeting** – J. David Brimmer – Pre-COVID, Fallsington enjoyed many activities. After COVID FMM had to adapt. They conducted meeting for worship and other activities via Zoom. Much of FMM spiritual energy is directed at Undoing Racism; they have adopted an anti-racism minute and are conducting classes in collaboration with the Peace Center on undoing racism. Several FMM members regularly take part in BLM vigils. FMM First Day School has weathered the COVID storm.

**Annual Report – Buckingham Meeting** – Christine Godshall – Buckingham membership has remained at the same level. Last March, BMM immediately suspended in-person meetings and began using Zoom for Meeting for Worship. Additionally, when weather permits, BMM has held a concurrent MFW outside. BMM has begun a “not just meeting for worship Wednesday” meeting. BMM is noticing more member involvement in BQM and PYM activities. BMM has noticed that some members are not attending via Zoom. Also COVID halted what had been strong growth in the First Day School program.

**Break**

**Treasurer's Report** – Ed Snyder– We are ¾ of the way through our fiscal year and seem to be on track; between FNB and Friends Fiduciary Fund we have \$111 K in assets. Meeting contributions are behind schedule but we expect to meet budget.

**2021-2022 Budget** – Ed Snyder – We are projecting \$279,850 in revenue; our contribution to PYM will be \$198,785. Friends requested that the \$7,000 allocated for monthly meeting outreach grants be included as a line item in the budget; the budget will show a \$7000 deficit. Our total expenses will be \$286,850. **2021-2022 Budget Approved**

**Proposal BQ Outreach Fund to support MM Outreach** – Ed Snyder – BQ Outreach is proposing to offer support the outreach efforts of BQ Monthly Meetings. Grants would be up to \$500 per cycle per meeting and could be used to fund any product or activity that supports Quakerism. Meetings would apply to BQ Outreach, who would review application and, provided the application meets minimum criteria, will approve the application. It is anticipated that BQ could renew this program for up to three years. **Proposal for BQ Outreach Grants is Approved for FY 2021-2022**

**BQ Budget and Nominating Committee** – Betsy Bayardi – BQM Budget and Nominating Committee are seeking nominations for the positions of Alternate Clerk and Assistant Treasurer.

**Annual Report – Chandler Hall** – Betsy Bayardi – This has been a very difficult year for Chandler Hall. In addition to the logistics of having to deal with protecting residents and staff from COVID, state and local health departments prohibited long-term care facilities from accepting new admissions. On site marketing efforts were also constrained. There have also been changes in CH leadership; they have a new CEO. CH is pleased to report that as of May 3<sup>rd</sup>, CH is open to visitors without the requirement of social distancing.

**Annual Report – Lehigh Valley** – Louise Young– LVMM closed its doors in March 2020 but the meeting remains active. LVMM has noted advantages of Zoom. LVMM has held outdoor MFW when weather permitted. Attendance at mid-week worship increased during quarantine. LVMM member continue to be active in social justice issues. Over the course of the past year, LVMM have a net loss of 2 members. Moving forward LVMM is planning to adopt a hybrid MFW model with both in-person and virtual platforms.

**BQ Oversight Committee** – Rick Dow – BQ Oversight meets regularly with the BQ Coordinator. These meeting include an annual performance review. Oversight feels that WK has done very well. Oversight notes that WK has taken advantage of technical expertise among our members to enhance the connections between meetings. In the past year WK has rebuilt the BQ website.

**Annual Report – Bucks Quarterly Meeting** - Leo Fitzpatrick– BQM has remained active in the face of COVID; BLM vigils at Lehigh Valley, Newtown, and Southampton meetings stand out as proactive efforts in raising awareness of social injustice. BQM has a new website that has helped us remain connected throughout the COVID ordeal. BQM’s Facebook page has also been an important communication tool. On Jan 30<sup>th</sup>, George Schaefer of PYM held an Eldership Workshop for BQM. There was a follow-up discussion at the February 2021 Quarterly meeting. While both positive and negative aspects of the training were raised, most felt that they came away with fresh insights. As monthly meetings plan for reopening, several are looking to hold hybrid meetings in order to retain the involvement of distant and infirm Friends and attenders. WK has formed a committee that is prepared to assist MM’s make the discernment. Grants are available from both BQM and PYM to help defray the cost of equipment for those meetings who choose to offer hybrid MFW.

**Guilford College Announcement** – Marie Branson Knapp – Guilford College has been particularly hard hit by COVID. While it’s true that there were problems in Liberal Arts Education, COVID has exacerbated the situation – particularly at Guilford. An alumni group has formed to re-envision how GC can continue to operate while maintaining a Quaker governance structure. Ms. Knapp wonders if BQM would draft a minute in support of GC; are there Friends who would be willing to help with recruitment and or fundraising?

**Silent Worship** – There being no further business, Friends settled into Silent Worship

**Adjournment** – Clerk Leo Fitzpatrick adjourned the Meeting for Business at 3:32 PM.

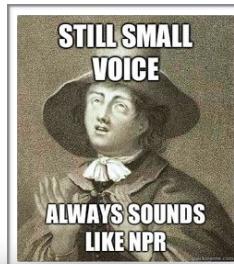
