# Review and Approval of Agenda – APPROVED

**Roll Call of Meetings:** Bristol–1; Buckingham–3; Doylestown–1; Fallsington–4; Lehigh Valley–1; Makefield–1; Middletown–5; Newtown–12; Plumstead–3; Quakertown–0; Solebury–1; Southampton–4; Wrightstown–1; Yardley–3.

### Announcements – Bill Daly

Middletown Friend reports that they will be hosting a Juneteenth celebration on June 24th.

Bucks Quarter Friends will be hosting a picnic in Tohickon Valley Park - June 17th.

Plumstead Friend reports that Plumstead Meeting will have a speaker after rise of meeting - July 23rd (Adam DePaul). He is the Chief of Education/Tribal Story Leader of Lenape Nation of PA).

Fallsington Friend reports that Fallsington Meeting will host concert (Annie Patterson), Friday, June 9th; cost \$15.00. Southampton Friend reports that they will host film "Quaker Schools and Indigenous Peoples" (via Zoom) Tuesday, May 23rd. Southampton Meeting has reserved a table at Southampton Days celebration in Upper Southampton Township - July 5-6 in the evening; they welcome visitors and are seeking volunteers to staff their table.

Buckingham Friend reports that the Peace Fair is scheduled for September 30th at Buckingham.

# Stories of Vitality & Growth -

Yardley Friend reports that they hosted a celebration of opening their labyrinth last Saturday evening, May 13th. They extend invitation to come enjoy the labyrinth and their grounds.

Southampton Friend reports that their meeting has air conditioning, and they are developing plans to expand its kitchen; June 11th Vigil for Social Justice continues.

Fallsington Friend reports that they recently offered "Quakerism in a Nutshell" course; after the course they added two new attenders; they intend to do follow-up to this course.

Solebury Friend – They recently hosted their annual pancake breakfast in support of Mercer Street Friends. This year their proceeds not only helped Mercer Street Friends, but also, they were able to contribute to the Camp Onas capital campaign. Wrightstown – their spiritual exploration group has restarted (Sunday AM prior to Meeting for Worship). Although they lack a Ministry and Worship Committee, this spiritual exploration group seems to fill part of that need and may help kindle a new Worship & Ministry committee. The meeting is celebrating their 300th anniversary.

Germantown Meeting Minute on Women's Reproductive Health – Bill Daly (minute attached). Friend Daly proposes that BQM adopt the same methodology any forward our similar Minute to PYM leadership team and to each Quarterly Meeting in PYM. **APPROVED**.

Clerks Annual Report/Spiritual Assessment of the Quarter – Bill Daly (report attached). Bill Daly notes that an assessment of the spiritual health of the Quarter should not originate with the Clerk of the Quarter but rather should be discerned by an independent committee. He proposes BQM form a group of Friends to review and assess our spiritual state of Bucks Quarterly Meeting. This ad-hoc committee will spend four to five months evaluating the spiritual and further, that this task be performed annually. This committee includes Kate Daly, Wendy Kane, and Bethann Morgan. Friend proposes that this initiative become an addendum of the BQM Clerk's Annual Report that it be accepted as such. **APPROVED**.

Presentation of final 2023-2024 Budget – Lisa Parry Becker (report attached). BQM will hold monthly meeting contributions at current level. Some monthly meetings have offered additional funding beyond the BQM request. BQM will hold PYM contributions to current level. If there is a surplus next year, we can make an adjustment to PYM contributions. Proposed BQM budget includes a 6% cost of living increase for the Coordinator. **APPROVED**.

Treasurer's Quarterly Report – Lisa Parry Becker (report attached).

Profit/Loss: BQM income and expenses are right on track. We are receiving disbursement from Friends Fiduciary as per scheduled. Monthly meeting contributions right on track; we have received 75% of what was requested from monthly meetings. BQM has received 90% of budgeted advertising income from Quakerphernalia. Expenses are at 75% of budget, right on track. Balance Sheet: There are still funds available from Kirkbride Estate contribution that can be utilized by Monthly Meetings for Outreach.

**Nominations to the Budget and Nominating Committee** – Leo Fitzpatrick. Friend Fitzpatrick proposes two new members of the Audit Committee; Rich Richardson of Newtown MM will serve a three-year term and Jim Michener of Southampton will serve a two-year term. **APPROVED**.

**Proposed Change to BQM Handbook**: Limits of Service for Clerk and Recording Clerk – Leo Fitzpatrick This proposal would change the Clerk's and the Recording Clerk's term of service from **one two-year term** to **up to three two***year terms*. Friend Fitzpatrick notes that this adjustment allows more time for Budget and Nominating to identify suitable candidates for these positions.

**Appeal for Nominee to PYM Nominating Council** – Wendy Kane. Wendy reviewed the PYM governance structure; notes that despite its relative size and vitality, BQM has no representative on PYM Nominating Council. Friend Christensen offers to *consider* accepting that role.

Friend Fox poses a rhetorical question; "are we ready for an 'old-timey' Quaker meeting" in a meetinghouse that lacks electricity and has latrines instead of bathrooms. There is general assent.

Friend Christensen rises to report that he is *not in unity* with this proposal. Among other concerns, Friend Christensen (who is visually impaired) notes that without electricity for his computer, he will not be able to serve as recording Clerk.

A discussion ensued; BQM **APPROVED** having our Eighth Month quarterly meeting hosted by Plumstead Meeting. Friend Christensen stood aside.

**Discussion – Recorder of Membership Position for the Quarter** – Bill Daly. Given the hour, the Clerk chooses to defer this Item to a subsequent meeting.

Review and Approval of Minutes from February Quarterly Meeting – Terry Christensen. APPROVED.

**Annual Report** – Chandler Hall .The Clerk notes that since BQM released Chandler Hall from our care several years ago, we acknowledge and anticipate that an annual report from Chandler Hall is no longer required in the conduct of our business. **APPROVED**.

Closing Worship – After a period of silent worship, the Clerk adjourned the meeting at 3:06 PM

AFSC brings together people of all faiths and backgrounds to challenge injustice and build peace around the globe. Below are some links for Friends to explore the work of this group:

<u>Stop funding Israeli violence against Palestinians</u>: This year has been deadly for Palestinians. Since the start of the year, at least 177 Palestinians—including at least 30 children have been killed by the Israeli military.

<u>Tell Congress: Act now for climate justice!</u> The climate crisis has disproportionately harmed Indigenous, Black, and Brown people and other marginalized communities worldwide. These communities have made the fewest contributions to greenhouse gases, yet they have faced the most devastating consequences to their health, livelihoods, and ecosystems.

#### Pass a Farm Bill to reduce hunger and address climate
