2020 Poor People's Campaign Virtual March on Washington

There are 140 million poor and low-wealth people in the richest country in the world; The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival is building a broad and deep national moral fusion movement - rooted in the leadership of poor people - to unite our country from the bottom up. On June 20, the digital stage is being built for people to join together to hear stories, solutions and songs of the movement leaders and artists.

Participants will receive information on how to go back to their communities to take action together and continue building power among the poor and dispossessed for November's election and beyond.

Locally, PYM has partnered with AFSC to support local community organizing around the Poor People's Campaign. The Quaker Life Council minuted an endorsement of the Poor People's Campaign alongside our Young Adult Friends community. Trenton Friends Meeting recently approved a <u>Minute in Support of the 2020 Poor</u> People's Campaign.

Mercer Street Friends Nourishing Minds & Bodies; Empowering Families and Communities

9 weeks • 125,000 meals 8,000 weekend emergency food bags 193 volunteers • 1,400 contributors

During the current pandemic Mercer Street Friends has been on the frontlines doing what they do best. For example, on Friday May 15 they distributed 2,170 weekend emergency food bags to individuals and families throughout Trenton and Mercer County. The volunteers are starting to recognize the same faces, week after week. Their staff can now greet some families by name. And the need within the community continues to increase.

The Mercer Street Friends Food Bank channels 2.7 million pounds of food and groceries annually to a network of 80 local food pantries, shelters, soup kitchens, meal sites, schools, senior and disabled programs, and low-income housing sites.

Mercer Street Friends has received tremendous support from over 1,400 donors in the past two months and Friends know that their gifts make an incredible impact on the community. Peace Fair 2020 Buckingham Friends Meeting

The Peace Fair Committee has been meeting and planning the 2020 Peace Fair, which is scheduled to be held from 10 am to 4 pm on Saturday, September 26 at Buckingham Friends Meeting.

At the last Quarterly Meeting for Business Friends had a chance to share their concerns about the committee's decision to hold the Peace Fair as planned given the COVID-19 pandemic and the current shelter in place orders from Governor Wolf.

Tim Cunningham, Clerk of the Peace Fair Committee explained that given the uncertainty of the course of the virus, the committee thought it prudent to plan as though restrictions will be lifted by September. He assured Friends that the committee is staying informed with regard to social distancing and shelter in place guidelines and will follow every precaution outlined by authorities. However, if shelter in place restrictions are not lifted, the committee is prepared to cancel the event and refund any vendor deposits received.



Friends agreed that they have faith in the committee's ability to assess the changing global situation and they will act responsibly.

Spotlight On Quakertown Meeting

Benchmark

As an attender at Quakertown Monthly Meeting for about two years, I volunteered to digitize old Meeting Minutes from 1957 up to the present for archiving at the Friends Historical Library at Swarthmore. This turned out to be a good project during New Jersey's shelter in place moment, and also enabled me to get to know earlier members of the Meeting through their thoughts and activities. One day I discovered an interesting letter in the 1991 folder containing paper copies of Minutes.

Dated May 20, 1991 and addressed to Visalia Monthly Meeting in California, the letter began with "At the request of Friend Ernest Sanger, we are sending you one of the benches from our Meeting House to become part of yours and a model for others. We know that meetings are people and not stones or planks, but there can be something in the physical structure itself which adds to the quality of the gathering therein. We trust that some of the love and togetherness which we feel when we are gathered in our Meeting House may have been absorbed by this bench and that it will in its own way add to the quality of yours."

Wow, what a beautiful sentiment! The letter went on to give a little of QMM's history and concluded with "We have sent you these two gifts, Ernest Sanger and the bench he asked for in your name—a good Quaker and a good Quaker bench. Both are built for utility and built to last. Neither has any false pretensions to style. Both can be very comfortable, requiring only an occasional shift in position to accommodate the uniqueness of the design. Both the Quaker and the bench are solid examples of their kind, and represent the best work of their respective

Makers. We consider both of them, the bench and Ernest Sanger, good examples to copy, and commend them to your loving care."

The letter was signed by George Engeman and Robin Meaker. I was eager to know the back story regarding this so I put the word out to several long time members. Doug Meaker filled in the gaps. He said that Ernest and Esther Sanger, plus their daughter Beth and husband Bill Lovett were two of the families that restarted QMM in the late 1950s. After his wife died, Ernest moved out to Visalia to be near Beth and her family. But, rather than waste space here, you can learn all about the Lovetts, the Sangers, and their relationship to the Visalia Meeting here: https:// www.quakeroaksfarm.org/about-us/

I wondered if the bench from QMM was still at Visalia Meeting so I googled them. On their home page (http:// visaliaquakers.org/) I found a photo of the interior of their Meeting House. To the right of the fireplace, under the window, sits QMM's bench, a long way from home but it obviously fulfilled its mission, and it appears happy and settled in with its newfound Friends, benches and people. I want to leave you with a lovely thought that Doug shared in his reminiscences about visiting the Lovetts and Ernest Sanger in California: "The Lovetts had peacocks and the Meetinghouse had one glass wall. We weren't there for Meeting for Worship but were told the peacocks would put on a display during MFW which rather broke it up."

So, if you are feeling down about not being able to get to your MFW and socializing with other Friends, think of a humble bench that traveled from one coast to another to spread love and fellowship, and marvel at peacocks spreading their jewel-toned feathers for worshippers to witness while waiting in silence for a message.

Around the Quarter

Since last month Makefield Meeting has begun having weekly virtual Meeting for Worship, followed by Adult First Day School. They welcome all Friends to join them.

Lehigh Valley Meeting is doing a great job keeping their community connected and socially active:

• They are developing plans for a Lehigh Valley Jail Release Assistance Fund, designed to provide bail and short-term housing aid to those who remain incarcerated because they are unable to cover those costs. The need for these funds has become particularly urgent to help relieve dangerous overcrowding in local jails during the pandemic. We will initially focus on the Northampton County Jail, and also hope to be able to work with the Lehigh County Jail eventually.

• Worship & Ministry hopes to expand virtual meetings for worship to include a mid-week gathering every other Wednesday. One focus of these meetings will be on healing and holding people in the Light.

• To increase information-sharing and strengthen the sense of spiritual connection within the Meeting, an informative "Light Board Message" is emailed to members and attenders twice each week.

Newtown Meeting was one of the first meetings to go virtual, and has continued to have robust Meeting for Worship as well as Adult First Day School. They have kept the children of the meeting connected by having a a 15 minutes check-in before worship.

As a way to continue to enjoy and build community, a virtual "eat and meet" is being held every Friday evening, where Friends "share" a community meal and conversation, followed by fun and games that are easy to play for both young and old.

Buckingham Meeting has also joined other meetings around the Quarter by having weekly virtual Meeting for Worship.

Yardley Meeting Friends are staying connected with each other via their Google Group. Friends post requests for assistance, musings, updates on health, inspirational music and pictures from their ongoing lives during shelter in place. Their monthly newsletter also provides news and inspiration:
