This version of the February 2022 Quarterly Meeting minutes contains the edited highlights. The minutes in full detail will be available for consideration on our website and at our virtual Quarterly Meeting in February under the care of Doylestown Meeting.

Friends gathered at 12:47 pm and settled into a period of worship.

Welcome – Leo Fitzpatrick

Review and Approval of Agenda – approved

Roll Call of Meetings: Bristol – 0; Buckingham – 3; Doylestown – 2; Fallsington – 6; Lehigh Valley – 2; Makefield – 1; Middletown – 2; Newtown – 9; Plumstead – 1; Quakertown – 4; Solebury – 1; Southampton – 5; Wrightstown – 2; Yardley – 3

Review and Approval of Minutes from 21st day, Eleventh Month, 2021 – approved.

Stories of Vitality & Strength – Wrightstown – meeting members repaired/installed a paved sidewalk from handicap parking to the meetinghouse (a 3-year project), solar powered lighting for entry/parking lot has been installed; Fallsington – held a retreat focused on increasing membership, becoming more attractive to seekers; Southampton – newspaper article publicizing their vigil published; they are holding visioning sessions to make their property more attractive and conducive to spiritual community building; Middletown – Friend reports on Edward Hicks Day celebration (Apr 23rd), they are performing social justice work in opposition to a PENNDOT proposed interchange which would disrupt the work of local churches; Bristol – gets noticed in Times Publishing magazines for work supporting Afghan refugees; Newtown – members have traveled to Harrisburg with members from other churches in support of equitable funding for public schools, their Black Lives Matters vigil still continues, the meeting is reopening for hybrid worship; Lehigh Valley – traditionally they conduct a "Frugal Feast" every 5th First Day (money that would be spent on individual groceries is directed to local food bank) – they have very successfully continued it virtually over the last two years; 20 people attended their "Quakerism 101" Workshop Doylestown – 13 year old young Friend applies for regular membership; Southampton – they have a Friend collecting data on racial incidents at Neshaminy High School and suppling that data to racial justice commission; Quakertown – reopening next month, they have learned of new members moving into area.

Nominating Committee – Betsy Bayardi; requesting approval of **Bill Daly** as Bucks Quarter Clerk - **Approved Minute of Appreciation for Leo Fitzpatrick** (attached) – Bethann Morgan – accepted with gratitude. **Quarter Coordinator Report** – Wendy Kane (full report attached).

Annual Report – Friends Camp Association – Scott Hoskins (full report attached) – Camp Onas opened in 2021 (after 2020 COVID hiatus), COVID mitigation policies resulted in no infections; Board proud of the way that Onas persevered in the last year in the face of financial pressures; Onas has need to replace some facilities – this work was begun in the fall; board reviewing the strategic plan with emphasis on facilities maintenance and increasing diversity among campers and staff; thanks Friends for support. Quakertown Friend asks how Camp Onas planning is to go forward in the face of the extant financial pressure (Onas expects increased enrollment and additional grant support.) It was suggested that someone should contact the Baltimore Yearly Meeting Camp System (Scott not aware of such contact, but it may have occurred). Friends Schools and Friends Camps may be source of future Friends.

Annual Report – Makefield Meeting – Jerry Taylor (full report attached) – they are a small meeting with 6-8 members plus 2 young adults regularly in attendance; meeting for worship closes at 10:45, followed by afterthoughts, light refreshments, and then Adult Forum. Makefield's Adult Forum continues every Sunday that does not have a meeting for business; four members typically attend via Zoom because of health concerns; throughout 2021 Makefield Monthly Meeting met in person with doors and windows open and maintaining social distancing (this is possible because of their available space and small numbers.)

Proposal - "Party of Friends Position Papers" - Jerry Taylor.

Treasurers Report – Ed Snyder (full report attached) – we are halfway through fiscal year and received a little under 50% in monthly meeting donations, though new donations have recently come in; expenses are running under budget; in general, we are in good shape. Budget & Nominating Report – Presentation of preliminary 2022-23 budget – Ed Snyder – we will need an increase in the monthly meeting contributions this coming year; we will budget a 5% increase in the Coordinator's salary to keep up with inflation; most items are running at the same cost; the Quarter has budgeted a 100% increase in donations (i.e., double the contribution) to Friends Village, Camp Onas, and Chandler Hall; projecting an increase in monthly meeting contributions; agreed to increase contribution to PYM by 5%. Preliminary budget will be sent to monthly meetings for their review and comments; a final budget will be presented at the May Quarterly Meeting.

Special Report – Confirming signatories for the bank **– Ed Snyder** – requested minute regarding authorized signatures – **approved. BREAK**

Annual Report – Bucks Quarter Outreach Committee – Doug Meaker (full report attached) – COVID continues to impact the work of the committee; monthly meetings find both advantages and challenges to growing spiritual community currently. A Friend asked does Outreach have representation from all meetings at this time? Not at this time, but a Middletown Friend announced his recent appointment. The Committee continues to administer grants for outreach. A Friend asked if the grant application is available on the Quarter website – yes, it is. Southampton Friend expresses hope that Outreach and other committees will have in-person meetings soon.

Annual Report – Doylestown Meeting – Liz Fritsch (full report attached) – Doylestown continues discernment about the correct mix of technology/in-person meetings that fit their needs as spiritual community; they had an outdoor meeting on Christmas Eve with caroling; First Day school has gone well on Zoom and hopes to meet in person in the spring; variety of topics for adult discussion group; they have installed Wi-Fi for hybrid meetings for members/attenders who find it difficult to meet in person. Wrightstown Friends commends Doylestown work collecting and assembling historical minutes.

Annual Report – Quakertown Meeting – **Pat Stover** (full report attached) – COVID has been particularly challenging for Quakertown; there are no cell phone towers in the area; they have had a busy year with continued support for a food pantry and providing Christmas gifts for Mercer Street Friends preschool children.

Discussion – Holding hybrid Quarterly Meeting – WK frames and leads discussion.

SUMMARY: we want to move forward with this topic. Wendy Kane and Clerk Bill Daly will develop framework with an eye to having recommendations for next meeting for business.

Announcements – Buckingham Friend plan to have a 300th (302nd actually) Birthday Celebration in June; Middletown Friends will be part of Edward Hicks Day in Langhorne on April 23rd (raindate April 24th); Southampton Friend reports Social Justice vigil continues; article in Bucks County Courier Times celebrates a marriage in the meeting. Lehigh Valley Friend offers support of Prayer and Light for peacemakers in Europe

Closing Worship – There being no further business, Friends settled into Silent Worship.

Adjournment – Clerk Leo Fitzpatrick adjourned the Meeting for Business at 3:32 PM



PYM Advocacy Policy Activism and advocacy cover a wide range of engagement and activities which Friends enter from a starting place of spiritual grounding. When PYM Friends' engagement is political, we must also

consider the legal expectations for the organization.

Tax-exempt organizations (**not individuals**)—and more explicitly churches—are extremely limited in their ability to lobby, that is, *they may not attempt to influence specific legislation*. They may not issue a call to action to ask public officials for a specific vote for or against specific legislation. They may not directly try to affect decision—makers' actions on legislation, and they may not engage in political campaigning for candidates for public office.

A review and discussion of this policy was held on Zoom on April 4th. The introduction to the policy by Jim Waddinton, clerk of Admin Council, and a detailed review of it by Christie Duncan-Tessmer, General Secretary, is recorded in this video.

Fighting Indians Documentary pre-release screening -Sunday, May 1st 2:00–4:00 pm: On May 16th, 2019, The State of Maine made history by passing "LD 944 An Act to Ban Native American Mascots in All Public Schools," the first legislation of its kind in the country. For Maine's tribal nations, the landmark legislation marked an end to a decades long struggle to educate the public on the harms of Native American mascotry. Fighting Indians chronicles the last and most contentious holdout in that struggle, the homogeneously white Skowhegan High School, known for decades as "The Home of the Indians." This is the story of a small New England community forced to reckon with its identity, its sordid history, and future relationship with its indigenous neighbors. It is a story of a small town divided against the backdrop of a nation divided where the "mascot debate" exposes centuries old abuses while asking if reconciliation is possible.
