## A Letter from Pat Mervine - Middletown Meeting:



Dear Friends,

I am working on a new book for the African American Museum of Bucks County. It will be a collection of vignettes that will reveal the little known stories of individuals in Bucks County during and following the days of slavery and abolition. The focus will be on enslaved and freed people of color and on the people of European descent who became their allies.

One example is the story of County Cornwall, son of an African Queen, who had ties to Wrightstown Meeting, Hulmeville, and Edward Hicks. Another is Martha Schofield of Newtown who founded a school in Aiken, SC, to educate freed Africans and their children; that school has evolved to become part of the public school system today. Other stories will include involvement of Buckingham Friends with Langhorn and Mary, the first legally married interracial couple who lived in the Solebury area; the freedom of an enslaved person purchased by residents of Bristol; the Friend from Wrightstown who was written out of meeting because he sold his enslaved person rather than freed him by manumission; the story of Jeremiah Langhorne, Cudjo and Joe, and Doylestown Borough; the lectures by Lucretia Mott and Frederick Douglass at Newtown Theater (how did they come to lecture there, who were their contacts in the area?); Alice of Dunksferry; the Purvis brothers in Bensalem, Richard Moore in Quakertown, Mahlon Linton of Newtown, and others involved with the Underground Railroad, to list just some of what I want to share. That's a lot, but I'm sure there is more to uncover, including freed people who remained in the area and became business owners, farmers,

educators, and accepted, contributing members of the community.

I'm especially interested in obscure stories, and that will take some serious digging! I have access to a number of books and articles that discuss the roots of abolition with Benjamin Lay and John Woolman, the resistance to and gradual acceptance of freeing enslaved people through manumissions but the lingering reluctance to accepting all people as equals (the wall in Middletown Monthly Meeting's graveyard is a stark reminder of this), and the biographies of people in Bucks County of that era who are more widely known. I also have access to several newspaper archives and the archives of the Quaker meeting minutes, all of the local historical societies, and the records in the Spruance Library. In other words, there's enough information out there to sift through to make this a lifelong endeavor without some guidance from Friends to help me better pinpoint my areas of research.

If Meetings in the Quarter have specific information in their archives, and if Friends know of any people from the past — possibly stories handed down from distant relatives or through involvement with local historical societies — that would be relevant, I would be most grateful to learn of these! Please remember that, while you may think this

information is well-known, it is likely only known within the Quaker community. I have been speaking about slavery in conjunction with the Boone farm at various events around the county and the typical reaction is, "Wait, what?? There were slaves here?!!" That's why this book and the AAMBC are so important.

As with my book on the Boone Farm, 100% of all proceeds will go directly to the Capital Campaign of the African American Museum of Bucks County. The construction of this much-needed museum is underway and is expected to open in 2024, but \$2 million is still needed to complete project. Donations, large and small, will be gratefully received at <a href="https://infoaambc.org/">https://infoaambc.org/</a>. As the museum nears completion, there will be opportunities for local organizations to volunteer time and talents for painting, landscaping, and other finishing touches. In addition to having this new book available for purchase in the museum's gift shop, some of the stories in the book will become part of the "hidden figures" exhibit.

## **Quarterly Meeting Recap**

It was a perfect summer day for Bucks Quarter Friends to gather in and around the 300 year old Plumstead Meetinghouse. As one of our smaller, more simple meetings (i.e., no electricity and no indoor plumbing) Plumstead Friends chose to have an in-person only quarterly meeting, as opposed to tackling the immense challenges of a hybrid meeting.

The program – A Quaker Response to Indigenous Issues – was chock full of important information and was well attended. Many thanks to Arla Patch of Doylestown Meeting and Lois Kuter from PYM for their informative presentation.

Lunch was the time to gather under the large white tent on the lawn and visit with Friends from around the Quarter (maybe someone that you met at the June Friends are Fun picnic?). Brown bag lunches were supplemented by homemade desserts, fruit and other goodies provided by Plumstead Friends.

At our Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business, in addition to the usual reports given by the Treasurer, Coordinator and monthly meeting annual reports, we discussed two larger issues:

**Support for Bristol Preparative Meeting:** with the loss of 2 of the 4 members of the meeting, Fallsington Friends have asked the Quarter for additional support with their

oversight of the meeting. Friends agreed to form an ad hoc committee to define what that support might look like.

Report from the Ad Hoc Technology Committee: this committee met to explore the cost and feasibility of the Quarter purchasing and administering the equipment necessary for meetings to have hybrid capability when they host Quarterly Meeting. This is an urgent issue as the location of our next Quarterly Meeting, Quakertown, NJ, does not currently have hybrid capability. How this can be accomplished in a manner that works for both in person and those on zoom is yet to be determined and we will continue to explore how to accomplish an inclusive Quarterly Meeting experience for all.

The next Bucks Quarterly Meeting will be held on Sunday, November 19th at Quakertown (NJ) Meeting; a virtual component has yet to be confirmed. The program will feature author Mary Lou Quinlan, speaking about her book *The God Box*, a story about how, following her mother's death, she finds her mother's "God Box," her private cache of notes to God on behalf of family, friends and strangers. Note by note, Mary Lou unearths a treasure of her mother's wiches and worries and insight. Her

### The ABCs of PYM

Back in the 1600s George Fox established the structure of monthly, quarterly, and yearly meetings. Today, Friends seem most familiar with monthly meetings, with monthly meeting

for business and our numerous committees. Fewer are aware of how a Quarterly Meeting works. And then there is the mystery that is the Yearly Meeting.

Philadelphia Yearly Meeting was established in 1683, which combined with the meetings in New Jersey in 1685 to make one yearly meeting that encompassed Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, and parts of Maryland. PYM currently has about 105 monthly meetings, which are grouped into 13 Quarterly Meetings. Bucks Quarter has the most monthly meetings, with 14 in our care. If you are a member of a monthly meeting, you are automatically a member of the Quarterly and Yearly Meeting.

The currently yearly meeting governance structure was established in 2015. Here is an overview of the structures that support the PYM corporate work and community.

There are three Councils: Nominating, Administrative (Admin), and Quaker Life (QLC). It is through the Nominating Council that members of Admin and QLC are appointed to do their work. Their charges are:

- Admin Council: to maintain the health and integrity of the finances, property, personnel, and long-term vision.
- **Quaker Life Council**: to maintain the health and integrity of the community, spiritual depth, and relationships.

Both Councils have substructures that support their work. But that is a story for the next issue.


### **September Reading Group**
